## The Sanctuary Has Been Rescued

In rescue parlance, a Sanctuary is a place that provides a safe haven for homeless animals, in our case Golden Retrievers and Golden/Lab blends. But, what if the Sanctuary itself was at risk of being destroyed? More about that later. First, I would like to digress for a moment and provide a little historical background on a special place that has already provided shelter to several thousand homeless canines.

Homeward Bound Golden Retriever Rescue was incorporated on January 1, 2000 by Jody and I and a core group of rescue volunteers. We were living in Sacramento at the time and realized that we were




going to need a larger piece of property if we were going to make a serious impact on the needless killing of homeless Goldens at area shelters. We began looking for property in Sacramento County, but were informed by a Sacramento County official that the County would never approve our rescue facility, no matter how state-of-theart it might be. It was both a peculiar and telling commentary about the mentality of some public officials. However, it just fueled our fire, our compassion to save lives.

As we began to search for suitable property outside of Sacramento County, we

were blessed with what could best be described as a miracle. Out of the blue, Jody received a telephone call from Pam Miller, a dear friend who had previously adopted several Goldens from us. Pam's mother, Norma Latham, owned an eight-acre parcel in Elverta, Sutter County. There was a dwelling on the property and a very large all-steel barn/shop building. Pam approached her mother about Homeward Bound moving onto the property, and, after meeting with us, Norma agreed to lease the property to Homeward Bound. Norma also promised that we would have first right to purchase the property if it ever were for sale.

Complicating matters was the fact that there was still a tenant residing in the dwelling. That did not slow Jody down one bit. She moved onto the property with a few rescue dogs, living in a trailer donated by a volunteer. I should mention that it poured rain for the entire three weeks before the tenant moved out and poor Jody was up to her ankles in mud. The dogs were housed in the shop building, only half of which had a concrete floor. There was no fencing on the entire property, not even one fence post. Jody was out there alone because I had to remain at our Sacramento home to prepare it for sale and tend to our own Goldens.

At long last, Jody and I were able to move into the dwelling on the property. The heating and air conditioning system in the house had long since ceased to function and we nearly froze that first winter.

## The Miracle of Sammy Jo

Although Homeward Bound focuses on rescuing purebred goldens, we do occasionally rescue golden mixes in need. Honey, a sweet golden mix was scheduled for euthanasia at a local shelter when Homeward Bound decided to give her a second chance at life. Here is the story of how this little "throwaway" has healed hearts and changed lives.

Ten months ago I felt I had little left to live for. A ravaging fire had destroyed my home and everything in it, including killing four of my five dogs. I was living in in a bleak, empty, rental, along with Boulder Bob, my one surviving dog, a big lovable St. Bernard.

I did not know how to go on after such a devastating loss. But poor Boulder was so traumatized that he would not eat, walk, or play, and went into an absolute panic if I tried to leave him alone, even for a few minutes. I knew he would starve or die of a broken heart if I didn't do something. Finally I knew that we had to get another dog, and quickly.

Years ago I had adopted a 15 year old Golden Retriever who lived to be 18. The three years we had together were wonderful and I loved her gentle, playful personality, so I called Homeward Bound. Lea answered the phone and after hearing my story, she said she would come to my house to fill out the application forms, as my computer had been destroyed in the fire. She also asked if she could bring a dog. I said absolutely, and she said she would bring Honey, her current foster dog, a golden mix.

When she arrived, out bounded this pure gold fluff-ball who bounced into the house and started playing with Boulder. An absolutely beautiful mixture of Golden Retriever and Samoyed, her coloring and face were pure Golden.

After we finished the paperwork, Lea invited me to the Homeward Bound Adoption Center to pick out my Golden the following weekend. Soon I noticed that Boulder was actually playing with Honey and responding happily. Boulder had not eaten in over a week, not a bite, not a treat. All of a sudden, they both started begging for treats. Then the play was on! They ran around the house as if "playing tag". They both ate. I could see the light coming back into Boulder's eyes, not to mention, my own. Honey was perfect! "I want her," I said to Lea. Lea explained that Honey had been surrendered to the shelter by her owner because of separation anxiety. I did not care. I have done rescue work with senior dogs for years, and, had several who had the same problem. I knew she was perfect. Besides, she was the sweetest, prettiest little girl I've ever seen. Lea said "yes" so we kept her right from that day.

I changed her name to "Sammy" after my old Golden, Samantha. She is sweet, funny, has a sense of humor. Folks

say she "smiles," and she does! She has few teeth, but can still put down a rawhide chew faster than any dog I've seen. She outruns Boulder when chasing a rabbit and he is only three! She swims, plays with my cat, is so good with kids, people, and all other animals.

We are back home now, as my house was rebuilt over the next 8 months. Although she had exhibited symptoms of separation anxiety while still in the rental house, as soon as we moved back home it was as if she had always lived here. Gone was the anxiety, the panic of being left alone. Now she suns herself on the deck, has a dog bed all her own (she, of course, prefers the couch), and is totally happy.

Boulder recovered completely thanks to this indomitable little spirit, and she helped me begin to heal also. Yes, she's a golden mix, but I call her, our "Golden Angel." Before Sammy, I was reluctant to bring another dog into my home for fear of "betraying" those I had lost in the fire. But Sammy's love

has enabled me to open my heart to two more orphans—Lollypop, a St Bernard, and Jessie a young St. Bernard Mix.

I knew it would take a miracle to bring both Boulder and myself back to healing, laughing again, going for long walks, and being open to loving again. And that is the miracle of Sammy Jo.

However, there was a lot to accomplish on the property and that took our minds off this minor discomfort. With the aid of numerous dedicated volunteers, we began the necessary renovations to the shop building, for it was to become the kennel building housing the dogs. Pam and Bruce Miller own PBM Construction and they donated a crew and materials to install a concrete floor in the other half of the shop building. We installed bat insulation and sheetrock on the interior walls of the shop building and had the ceiling sprayed with acoustical insulation.

We installed hundreds of fence posts and several thousand feet of 6foot high fencing to contain our Golden residents. All the plumbing and

electrical systems in the shop building were brought up to code. Then we added the final touch—a 1600 square foot kennel building inside the shop building. It is fully insulated with its own dedicated heating/air conditioning system. To this day, the dwelling in which we live does not have a heating/air conditioning system, but those pampered dogs live in air conditioned comfort. I guess we have our priorities straight!

During that first year, we became intimately acquainted with various officials from Sutter County government. They were initially skeptical of our project and our capabilities, as they had experienced considerable difficulties with at least one other rescue organization in the County. They informed us of the many Sutter County laws and regulations governing rescue facilities and we complied with every one and then some. These folks were very supportive throughout the arduous permit process and we actually received rave reviews from the Sutter Planning Commission when our Use Permit was finally approved.

Now we fast forward to November, 2005. A developer contacted Norma Latham and made an offer to purchase the Sanctuary property. He indicated that once the property changed hands, all of the buildings would be demolished so that a housing development could be built.

Needless to say, this caught us off guard. All along, we had intended to purchase the property from Norma, but were not quite ready to do so from a financial standpoint. However, the developer forced our hand. Jody immediately sprang into action by contacting Greg Fulkerson, an ardent supporter of Homeward Bound. Greg owns Mortgage Network Resources in Davis and he put together a loan package for us in record time.

Once the financing was finalized, we contacted Norma. True to her word, she accepted our offer and all of us at Homeward Bound breathed a collective sigh of relief. If Norma had sold the property to the developer, Homeward Bound would have ceased to exist. On December 21, 2005, Jody and I became the owners of the property. Homeward Bound, and the Sanctuary was saved. As long as we have our health, Homeward Bound and the Sanctuary will continue to flourish at 7495 Natomas Road, Elverta, CA.

We all owe a deep debt of gratitude to Norma Latham, her daughter Pam Miller for her continued support of Homeward Bound and to Greg Fulkerson for helping us to realize our dream.

## The Well Behaved Golden

Does your precious golden have a habit of helping himself to things that don't belong to him? Do you find yourself saying "N0" a zillion times a day? Maybe I can help. I'm Joshua, a handsome nine-year-old golden, and I help my mom train the foster dogs who come to stay with us. You know, we dogs want to do the right thing. We need YOU to help us learn the rules. A long time ago my mom taught me the "leave it" command, and now I know when to leave things alone that don't belong to me. You can teach it to your dog too!



"Leave it" is one of the most important commands you can teach your dog, because it could prevent him or her from taking something that could cause injury or illness. Once your dog has learned "leave it," you'll find many opportunities to use it and you'll be able to stop saying "no" so often.

Here's the thing about saying "no" frequently. It just tells your dog that he's doing something wrong again. It doesn't really tell him what you want him to do. By replacing some of those "no's" with positive commands such as "off" and "leave it", your dog gets to learn what you want and has another opportunity to succeed.

"Leave it" is easy to teach. Find a "forbidden object," something that you will never allow your dog to have. It should be something desirable, such as a shoe or slipper or forbidden food (that's my favorite)! Place the forbidden object on the floor in front of your dog. As soon as he moves toward it, say "leave it," and gently push his nose to the side. Repeat until the dog looks away. The minute he looks away, even for a second, give him a happy "Yes!" and give him a treat. Next, place the object closer to your dog and in various locations near him, repeating the command, and rewarding him with "yes!" when he looks away. With your dog on leash, walk him near the forbidden object, saying "leave it" as you approach the object. When he looks away, praise him.

When you've finished your practice session, put the forbidden object away. He'll learn that it's off limits if you are consistent and don't allow him to have it.

You'll find many opportunities to use "leave it" - on walks when your dog approaches another dog or person that you don't want him to approach; when he's interested in something yucky on the sidewalk; when he starts nosing around your sandwich on the coffee table; when he rushes to grab the cookie your son just dropped on the floor. "Leave it" teaches your dog exactly what you want from him. And by complying with the command, he gets an opportunity to please you. That's a win-win situation!
